Age requirements to attend IISD elementary schools:

Prekindergarten: Four years old on or before Sept. 1 (Prekindergarten students must also be limited English proficient or below the economic subsistence level.)

Kindergarten: Five years old on or before Sept. 1

First Grade: Six years old on or before Sept. 1, or enrolled in the first grade, or completed kindergarten, in the public schools of another state prior to transferring to the District.

Students attend schools in the attendance area where their parents reside. For information regarding which school a student should attend, contact the closest school principal's office or the Public Information Department at 972-215-5200.

Entrance Requirements

Students entering IISD schools from other accredited schools are admitted at the level authorized by individual transcripts.

Students enrolling in the IISD must provide satisfactory evidence of required immunizations, proof of residency, and Social Security numbers are requested.

Immunization Requirements

Texas law requires immunizations for all students enrolled in schools.

- 4 Polio (3 if 1 received after age 4)
- 1 Measles/Mumps/Rubella (1 after 1st Birthday)
- 1 Hib after 15 months (or 3 before 15 months)
- 3 Hepatitis B
- 1 Varicella (dose or history of Chicken Pox)

Kindergarten, First Grade

- 4 Diphtheria/Pertussis/Tetanus (1 after age 4)
- 3 Polio (1 after age 4)
- 2 Measles/Mumps/Rubella (2 after 1st Birthday)
- 3 Hepatitis B
- 1 Varicella (dose or history of Chicken Pox)

Second, Third, Fourth & Fifth Grades

- 3 Diphtheria/Pertussis/Tetanus (1 after age 4)

- 3 Hepatitis B
- 1 Varicella*** (dose or history of Chicken Pox)

Sixth Grade

Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth & Eleventh Grades

- 3 Diphtheria/Pertussis/Tetanus ** (1 after age 4)

- 2 Measles/Mumps/Rubella (2 after 1st Birthday)
- 3 Hepatitis B
- 1 Varicella ****(dose or history of Chicken Pox)

Twelfth Grade

- 3 Diphtheria/Pertussis/Tetanus ** (1 after age 4)
- 3 Polio (1 after age 4)*
- 2 Measles/Mumps/Rubella (2 after 1st Birthday)

*Polio vaccine not required for persons eighteen years of age or older

**Tetanus/Diphtheria booster required 10 years after last DPT or DTaP

***Varicella vaccine must be given after the first birthday

****Two doses of Varicella vaccine if first dose is given on or after age 13.

Serologic proof of immunity is acceptable in lieu of Measles, Mumps and Rubella. Serologic proof

of immunity or serologic evidence of infection for Hepatitis B is acceptable in lieu of Hepatitis B vaccine.

Exclusions from compliance are allowable on an individual basis for medical contradictions and religious conflicts as specified in Texas Education Code 2.09, Chapter 97. For further information, contact a school nurse.

Students attend classes in air-conditioned schools complete with cafeterias, libraries and gymnasiums. Several buildings have received national attention for their design.

IISD voters approved a \$249.5 million bond program in October 2001. These funds are being used to provide for new construction to accommodate enrollment growth, to renovate existing schools/ other facilities, to provide additional technology for instruction and support services, to improve disabled access, and to update heating, ventilation and air conditioning.
